Leadership Transitions Continue Progress

2017 marked a year of significant administrative changes at Mountain Empire Community College with the retirement of the college's president and the selection of the second female president in the college's history.

Dr. Scott Hamilton, who joined MECC as president in 2010, announced his retirement effective July 1, 2017. Dr. Hamilton had previously served as the Dean of Instruction at Eastern Idaho Technical College in Idaho Falls, ID. A native of Illinois.

Dr. Hamilton's experience includes

work in the mining industry as well as instruction and administration in high school- and community college-level career and technical education.

During his tenure at MECC, Dr. Hamilton oversaw the renovation of Dalton-Cantrell Hall, construction of new access and entrance facilities, numerous campus improvements, the development of several new career and technical programs, and the college's SACSCOC five-year reaffirmation.

"When I came to MECC I had been told by many people that MECC had a hard-working and dedicated staff who made it their mission to help the people of Southwest Virginia," said Hamilton. "Over the last six and a half years I have found that to be very true. Thousands of lives have been changed through the hard work and commitment to students by the faculty and staff here and I am sure that tradition of service will continue."

A search for MECC's new president began in the spring of 2017. Dr. Kristen Westover, who served as the Vice President for Academic and Student Services at Patrick Henry Community College in Martinsville was selected to serve as the college's seventh president. She is the second female to fill the role.

"I've known Kris for nearly a decade. She's a rising star among our nation's higher education executives," said VCCS Chancellor Glenn DuBois. "I'm looking forward to what she has to offer the college and the community."

In her first six months at MECC, she has worked

to established a revised mission. vision, and values statement for the college as well as led the development of a new strategic plan that will lead the college into the next decade.

Although Dr. Westover has enjoyed more than 25 years of experience in higher education,

she admitted that education was not something she "really enjoyed or embraced" as a child. She dropped out of high school at age 16 and worked in construction and other jobs before taking a factory job. When the plant closed, Dr. Westover eventually enrolled in an evening college course. She became a high school math teacher and was a community college faculty member before taking college administrative positions.

"It was through the community college experience that I began to realize I could aspire to more and could do more and be more, and that I wasn't stuck in what I was in; that it was up to me to change," Westover said. "I believe that my story can encourage our current and potential students at MECC to think

MECC TOP Among Community Colleges **Nationwide**

MECC has been named one of the top 150 community colleges **in the nation** according to The Aspen Institute College Excellence Program.

The college is eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence to be awarded in the spring of 2019. The Prize, awarded every two years, is the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance among America's community colleges and recognizes institutions for exceptional student outcomes in four areas: student learning; certificate and degree completion; employment and earnings; and access and success for minority and low-income students.



MECC was named a top 150 finalist out of a pool of nearly 1,000 public twoyear colleges nationwide in October 2017. The college will participate in additional staff interviews and submission of additional student outcome data. The top ten finalists will be named in May 1018.

"MECC values and measures student performance related to learning outcomes, progression through academic programs, success in completing credentials, and ensuring those outcomes are equitable across diverse sectors of our student population. I am excited that the college has been recognized for our exceptional outcomes that empower citizens for better lives," said Dr. Kris Westover, President at MECC.

Thank You, Donna Stanley

MECC Foundation Executive Director Donna Stanley retired in May 2017 following 24 years of service to Mountain Empire Community College and its students.

During her tenure, Stanley grew the MECC Foundation to hold the largest endowment in the Virginia Community College System. She will be recognized by the Virginia Community College System in April 2018 with the Chancellor's Award for Leadership in Philanthropy.

Stanley credited the Foundation's success to God, the communities the college serves, her staff members, past college presidents and members of the foundation board. She noted that one of the most rewarding aspects of her job was in building strong relationships with the college, students,



community members, alumni, staff, and individuals who have strong ties to the region but now live elsewhere.

"It was extremely gratifying for me to be associated with all of these wonderful people," Stanley said. "It has changed my life for the better, made me feel optimistic about the future, and it should raise the bar for

what everyone thinks is possible for this region."

Following Stanley's retirement, MECC Foundation Board Member Bonnie Elosser agreed to serve in an interim director role until December 31, 2017. Amy Greear, who has served as the college's Community Relations Coordinator since 2012, has been appointed as the Interim Director of Institutional Advancement effective January 3, 2018.

Joe Fuller, Leader in Philanthropy

Joe Fuller of Nickelsville was recognized by the Virginia Community College System with the 2017 Chancellor's Award for Leadership in Philanthropy.

Fuller has dedicated his life to bettering his community. Retiring from CSX in 1988, he devoted his time to fostering the growth and progress of Scott County. He served as a member of the MECC Foundation Board of Directors for two terms (1991–1997) and continues to support special events of the college. In 2012, the Rotary Club of Scott County renamed its existing MECC Foundation Scholarship in Joe's honor.

In addition, Fuller was instrumental in establishing a new Rotary Club of Scott County in November 1988. He served as charter club president and continues to be very active in club and district activities. He received a Rotary Paul Harris Fellow award in 1989 and a Skelton Fellow Award of Rotary District 7570 for year 2004–05. Fuller served as President of the Scott County Chamber of Commerce from 2002–03 and has served as

"Because of Joe Fuller's generosity and hard work, more students are receiving help in meeting their educational expenses, and they have more options for working in their local community. Dr. Amanda Graham, Alumnus of the Year

MECC's 2017 Outstanding Alumni of the Year is Dr. Amanda Graham, a licensed professional counselor and 2001 graduate of Mountain Empire Community College.

Graham, a native of Lee County, received her Associate of Arts and Sciences degree in General Studies

from Mountain Empire Community College in 2001. She earned her Bachelor's degree in Psychology from Lincoln Memorial University, her Master's degree in Rehabilitation Counseling from the University of Kentucky, and a Doctor of Education degree in Counseling Psychology from Argosy University in Sarasota, Florida. Dr. Graham is a National Certified Counselor, a certified Substance Abuse Counselor, and a certified Master Addiction Counselor.



Graham credits the caring professors at MECC for inspiring her to continue her education.

"MECC not only gave me the confidence to complete my education, but also gave me strength to set higher, reachable goals for myself. Not many colleges can offer that."


Dr. Graham was recognized with a Mentor

Tutoring Programs Build Student Success

The Parallel tutoring program has been a successful initiative by the MECC Foundation since 2009. Students who are served by the Parallel program would not otherwise receive tutoring or academic advising. MECC's primary tutoring program is a 100% federally funded grant, Student Support Services, which serves low-income and first-generation students in specific degree programs. Without the Parallel tutoring program, students who do not meet the federal guidelines, as determined by the Department of Education, would be left without access to tutoring or other support services.

Supplemental Instruction (SI) is a peer-led supplementary class for Biology,

Anatomy and Physiology, Chemistry, and Statistics. These challenging courses can derail a student's progress toward a degree, particularly in health care majors. SI has proven

successful in increasing course pass rates and semester-to-semester retention of participating students. The MECC Foundation has funded SI since 2007. One of the advantages to SI is that all professors have offered extra credit for regular attendance to these peer led sessions.

The 2016–17 school year included this success data for the SI program:

- Fall 2017 saw expansion of the current SI offerings to include Anatomy and Physiology, Chemistry, and Statistics, which resulted in a 92.5% pass rate and an 89% retention rate. There were 67 students served.
- In Spring 2017, only BIO 101 and 102 were offered, with 41 students served, an 83% pass rate and a 59% retention rate.
- In Fall 2016, only BIO 101 was offered, with 53 students participating, an 80% pass rate and a 64% retention rate.

"As a returning student already in possession of a bachelor's degree, access to free tutoring and support services would otherwise be unavailable to me without

the Parallel and SI programs," participating student Lori Mullins explains. "I am currently enrolled full time and am pursing a degree in the medical field, which is a new and differing path from the one I was on previously. I have been met with several challenging courses along the way. After seeking oneon-one tutoring and SI, these programs have not only helped me to succeed in these challenging courses, it has helped me excel in them as well."

High-powered Workforce Development Opportunities

MECC Student Derrick Watkins decided to enroll in MECC's Power Lineman Program because he wanted a long-term career. He wasn't disappointed.

With a high demand for power lineman workers, Watkins received a job offer with an Electrical Contractor before he had even completed the 15-week training.

"It's a really good program. I joined it looking to build a career. I just got a job offer from Davis H. Elliott. I would encourage anybody to do this program."

Thanks to an MECC Foundation application for a grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission, MECC was able to establish the only training opportunity for power lineman workers in far Southwest Virginia. Now training its third cohort of students, MECC has established partnerships with power industry employers to equip participants for entry-level employment as apprentice and utility line workers.

The \$950,000 grant supported start-up costs of the program, including hiring faculty, purchasing vehicles, and educational supplies.

"It's a career that you can get into that will equal what you can get with a four-year degree in wages," said Jeffery Boggs, power lineman instructor. "It's a career that is in big demand. I've been doing this for 30 years and there has never been enough linemen to go around. I don't see that changing, mainly because everyone can't do this. You have to be mentally tough and physically tough to do it. Being able to deal with heights and deal with high voltage, it's not for the faint of heart."

Lee County Endowed Scholarship Progress

A grassroots effort to support Lee County graduates with scholarship funding to attend MECC is making great strides toward a goal of raising \$30,000.

The Lee County Endowed Scholarship Committee recently formed to assist Lee High and Thomas Walker High School graduates. The group hopes to raise enough funds to establish the only scholarship dedicated to Lee County students attending MECC.

An anonymous donor has offered to match all donations up to \$30,000 that are contributed to the fund. The group, which includes Chair Cynthia Kinser, Wandaleen Adams, Leah Herring, Chris Jones, Donna Lock, Rita McCann, Diana Pope, Jason Sturgill, and Shirley Watson, has already raised several thousand dollars.

"The Lee County Scholarship is a vital step in bringing new industry into Southwest Virginia," said volunteer Jason Sturgill. "In order to revitalize Southwest VA, we must attract new businesses and new industries. These companies want a young

> workforce that is trained and capable of performing at a high level in the jobs of tomorrow. By having a scholarship designed for graduates of Lee County Schools, we remove one of the biggest obstacles of higher education in SWVA today which


is financing. The students selected to receive this scholarship can begin their post-high school education without the extra burden of financing."

Financial Summary 2016–2017 Academic Year


Investment in Educational Services

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Buccaneer Scholarship Donors

The MECC Foundation is providing special recognition to generous Big Stone Gap High School alumni and community friends for cumulative support of the Buccaneer Scholarship. The mascot of the former Big Stone Gap High School was the Buccaneer. A group of alumni created the Buccaneer Scholarship in 2003 to honor the legacy of their alma mater, which closed in 1959, and to benefit graduates of Powell Valley High School. Since then, 52 graduates of either the former Powell Valley or Union High Schools have received renewable scholarships to attend MECC. As of June 30, 2017, a total of \$100,475 in scholarships had been awarded to students, including \$11,800 for 2017–2018 awards. In addition to those funds, the Buccaneer Scholarship Committee had raised an additional \$11,125 in unrestricted scholarship funds and had received gifts for nine endowed scholarships, valued at \$410,725 by June 30, 2017.

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
