MECC hosted the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC) On-Site Committee in October 2019 as part of the College's Ten-Year Reaffirmation and was found to be compliant in the majority of SACSCOC standards.

A large portion of the On-Site Committee's review was aligned with the College's Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP). The Committee reviewed the five components of MECC's QEP, provided strong feedback and suggestions about the plan, and found only one recommendation as part of this review process.

The full SACSCOC Board will act on MECC's reaffirmation in the summer of 2020. As part of the site visit process, the SACSCOC Committee Chair shared that she appreciated MECC's hospitality and focus on student success.

"We are extremely pleased with the results of the SACSCOC reaffirmation visit," said MECC President Kristen Westover. "Every MECC faculty, staff, and administration member played a role in the accreditation process and visit. To be found in compliance with the majority of standards is a tremendous accomplishment and I cannot thank our amazing team enough for their work."

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Aspen Institute Names Mountain Empire Community College as a Top 150 U.S. Community College Eligible for 2021 Aspen Prize



The Aspen Institute College Excellence Program named Mountain Empire Community College as one of 150 community colleges eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's signature recognition of high achievement and performance among America's community colleges. Based on strong and improving student outcomes—including achievments in learning, completion rates, employment rates and earnings, and equity—15 percent of community colleges nationwide have been invited to apply for the Aspen Prize.

"MECC spends a great deal of time and effort creating and offering programs designed to provide students with the greatest opportunity for completion and success. It is certainly rewarding to be recognized as an Aspen Institute Top 150 College for our accomplishments related to these endeavors," said Kristen Westover, MECC President.

The 150 community colleges named as eligible to compete for the 2021 Aspen Prize were selected from a pool of nearly 1,000 public two-year colleges nationwide using publicly available data on student outcomes. Located in 39 states in urban, rural, and suburban areas, serving as few as 500 students and as many as 75,000 students, these colleges represent the diversity and depth of the community college sector.

Mountain Empire Community College is pleased to announce the College has been awarded a \$2.2M Department of Education Title III Strengthening Institutions Grant. MECC's Pathways to Student Success Grant will support expansion of academic programs, renovation of classroom spaces, and additional student advising support.

The goal of MECC's Title III grant is to improve student's access to education through expansion of academic programming in the science and health science areas, offer additional classes and flexible class scheduling, and require students to participate in comprehensive, one-on-one advising. As a result, student retention and completion rates will be increased. In addition, MECC students will benefit from improved quantitative literacy skills through additional faculty training and improved technology.

The five-year grant will enable MECC to hire four new full-time faculty members in science and health science program areas. Additionally, two laboratories will be renovated at the Big Stone Gap campus to be used in biology, anatomy, phlebotomy, and pharmacy tech courses.

Another aspect of this award allows the College to participate in an endowment challenge to increase the College's endowment funds. As part of

the challenge, the MECC Foundation has set a goal to raise \$225,000 over a five-year period, with all funds raised to be matched by the Title III grant. The funds will be used to support the goals outlined in the grant program.

"The MECC Foundation is excited to announce our goal to raise \$225,000 to support students and college infrastructure improvements. The pledge match from the Strengthening Institutions Grant will result in a significant, long-term impact to our campus and our region," said Amy Greear, Vice President of Institutional Advancement and Executive Director of the MECC Foundation.


# MECC Foundation Raises \$100,000 to Support Scott County Students


# Debra Rene Greene Memorial Endowed Scholarship

# Columbus Phipps Foundation Supports International Travel Opportunities For MECC Students

Students at Mountain Empire Community College have the opportunity to broaden their educational and cultural experiences by participating in international travel thanks to scholarships provided by the MECC Foundation, Columbus Phipps Foundation, and local student activity funding.

Mike Strouth, a former MECC History Instructor, launched the international travel program more than 20 years ago to provide students with an affordable global education experience. Hundreds of MECC students from Southwest Virginia have been able to participate, with scholarships averaging at least \$1,000 per student.

Destinations have included England, Ireland, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Greece, Portugal, Spain, Japan, Australia, and Costa Rica. Alumni and members of the community are also invited to travel. The experience provides students with service learning opportunities and cultural immersion experiences. In Costa Rica, students planted trees to support rainforest regeneration. In Japan, students engaged in games and learning activities with Japanese college students and visited the Honda international headquarters.

MECC's mission is to provide an educated, globally competitive workforce. The majority of students who participate in the international travel program have never traveled abroad, with some students never having journeyed outside of the region. While traveling, students learn to navigate an airport, use public transportation including a subway system, exchange currency, and acquire basic foreign language skills.

# Center for Workforce and Innovation of Appalachia Open House


MECC held an open house for the Center for Workforce and Innovation of Appalachia in August 2019 as part of the annual Appalachia Railroad Days Festival. Visitors toured the facility, which now houses MECC's Power Lineman, Commercial Driver's License Training and Testing, Dental Assistant, and Smart Farming Programs. The open house also featured a special "Meet Your Teacher" event with former teachers at Appalachia Elementary School available to meet with their students. Since its opening, the Center for Workforce and Innovation has served hundreds of students as well as community members. The MECC Foundation and MECC have secured more than \$2M in federal and state grant funds to support renovations and programming at the site.

# **Legislative Visit**

The MECC Foundation hosted students Cameo Smith, Cameron Cope and Christian Hale for the 2019 Legislative Visit hosted by the Virginia Community College System. Students were able to visit with Virginia legislators Terry Kilgore, Ben Chafin, and Bill Carico one-on-one to discuss the importance of community college funding and were recognized on the floor of the Virginia Senate by Sen. Bill Carico. The students also attended the 2019 Legislative Reception hosted by the Virginia Foundation for Community College Education along with MECC President Kristen Westover, MECC Foundation Executive Director Amy Greear and MECC TRIO Programs Director Jessica Ketron.

# MECC Foundation Hosts Author Ron Rash for 43rd Annual John Fox Jr. Literary Festival

The MECC Foundation, in partnership with the Lonesome Pine Regional Library and the National Endowment for the Arts Big Read Project, hosted New York Times best-selling author Ron Rash for the 43rd annual John Fox Jr. Literary Festival.



Ron Rash is a New York Times best-selling author, PEN/Faulkner finalist, two-time winner of the O. Henry Prize, and winner of the James Still Award from the Fellowship of Southern Writers. His reading for the Festival included stories of growing up in rural North Carolina, his experiences writing and formulating characters, and his love for the Appalachian region and its people.

# Dual enrollment classes

Students at Ridgeview High School who participated in dual enrollment classes through Mountain Empire Community College received tuition support this year from the Columbus Phipps Foundation in partnership with the Mountain Empire Community College Foundation. All MECC dual enrollment students enrolled at no cost to the student or high school this year, thanks to the Columbus Phipps Foundation support. 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# Community College Philanthropists Honored with 2019 Chancellor's Award for Leadership in Philanthropy

The Virginia Community College System and Chancellor Glenn DuBois has presented Ralph and Shirley Fisher of Big Stone Gap with the 14th Annual Chancellor's Award for Leadership in Philanthropy. The Fishers were nominated for the award by the MECC Foundation.

Ralph Fisher was born and raised in the Wildcat section of Big Stone Gap, attended East Stone Gap and Powell Valley High School and served in the US Army for two years, with one year in Vietnam. He was employed by C & P Telephone (now Verizon) until his retirement. Shirley Fisher was born and raised in Appalachia and graduated from Appalachia High School. She attended Clinch Valley College (now UVA-Wise) and Mountain Empire Community College. Mrs. Fisher was employed at First National Exchange Bank (now Wells Fargo) as a teller and vault teller for 15½ years. The Fishers have created the Ralph T. and Shirley M. Fisher Endowed Scholarship benefitting students enrolled in technical programs at Mountain Empire Community College.

The Fishers were recognized along with two dozen other individuals, families, and businesses from around Virginia for their exceptional support of Virginia's Community Colleges. The awards were presented at

a luncheon sponsored by the Virginia Foundation for Community College Education in Richmond on Tuesday, April 16th, 2019. As part of the award, each college received funds for the Commonwealth Legacy Scholarship, named in honor of the college's 2019 Chancellor's Award recipient.

Now in its 14th year, the Chancellor's Award for Leadership in Philanthropy recognizes outstanding leaders who have helped support Virginia's Community Colleges and their respective foundations. This year, among those to be honored are four members of VCCS faculty. This year's class of distinguished philanthropy leaders has contributed a combined total of more than \$18 million dollars to Virginia's Community Colleges.

# Belcher Named 2019 MECC Alumna of the Year



Dr. Alicia Belcher, a resident of St. Paul and math teacher at Ridgeview High School, was named MECC's Alumna of the Year for 2019.

Belcher, a 2014 Summa Cum Laude graduate of MECC, earned an Associate's Degree in Pre-Teacher Education. She began at MECC as a non-traditional college student, enrolling as a single mother in her thirties with only a high school education. After graduating from MECC, Belcher graduated Summa Cum Laude in 2015 from UVA-Wise, earning a Bachelor's Degree in Liberal Arts and Sciences with a Concentration in Mathematics and Teaching Endorsements in PK-12, Special Education, Middle School Mathematics, and High School Mathematics.

In 2017, she graduated Summa Cum Laude from Aurora University, earning a Master's Degree in Mathematics Education. She is currently in the dissertation sequence at Northcentral University where she earned her PhD in Education with a specialization in Curriculum and Teaching in late 2019. She maintained a 4.0 GPA in her graduate work.

Belcher teaches mathematics at Ridgeview High School in Dickenson County where she assists more than 40 at-risk youth as they earn high school diplomas. She is also an employee of UVA-Wise Upward Bound Program where she teaches at-risk youth in several mathematics classes and heads up several STEM projects.

Belcher formerly worked for nearly 12 years with local nonprofit agencies serving at-risk youth, victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, and the local homeless population. Additionally, she is a GLOBE certified instructor in the areas of atmosphere, biosphere, hydrosphere, and pedosphere.

The Computer-Aided Drafting & Design Technology, Technical Studies/Welding, Computer Manufacturing Technology/Industrial Electronics are accredited by the Association of Technology, Management, and Applied Engineering (ATMAE).
